FINANCE COUNCIL MINUTES

Thursday, September 21, 2023 Unapproved Minutes

St. Wendelin's Finance Council held its meeting on Thursday, September 21, 2023, at 6:30 p.m. at St. Wendelin's School, Luxemburg.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Jeanne Lommel, Lisa Lichte, Kelly Knier, Todd Hurrle, trustees Joe Watrin and Erin Lommel. Guest: Tracy Dombrovski

REVIEW OF AGENDA: A motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Lisa and carried unanimously to approve said agenda.

Tracy went over a few things that were discussed at the Parish Life Committee meeting the previous week. A few Parish activities were talked about including the following: Parish liturgy meetings, Funeral greeter/ guider and possibly updating the Parish Directory. Tracy will work with her committee on these.

REVIEW OF PREVIOUS MINUTES:

The members reviewed the minutes from May. A motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Todd, and carried unanimously to approve said minutes.

FINANCIAL REPORTS: The council reviewed all the financial reports including collection trends, actual vs budget, and balance sheet.

Discussion of having contribution envelopes being sent out was had. It is cheaper to have them sent out every 2 months than every 3 months. The postage cost goes up drastically after having too many envelopes in each package. It was voted on to have them sent out every 2 months from here forward. Motion to approve said reports were made by Todd and seconded by Kelly and carried unanimously to approve said reports.

OLD BUSINESS

A review of the Long-Range plan was done. Update was done on the current school situation. We are now separated from the CCS and looking good so far. We are still looking to fill one more teaching spot, a Music and Computer teacher. We have 51 students Preschool thru 5th grade. Looking to possibly add another Pre-school classroom.

NEW BUSINESS

2023 Parish Bazaar results are in and they are very positive. We had a very good year.

Parish Soft software is being updated so each Parish in the cluster has its own login.

The meeting adjourned at 8:32 p.m. with a closing prayer lead by Todd.

MINUTES FROM ST. ANNE'S CHRISTIAN WOMEN'S MEETING

St. Anne's Christian Women met Tuesday, October 10, 2023 in Mary Hall, beginning with social time/refreshments at 6:30 p.m. followed by President Karen Des Autels calling the business meeting to order at 6:45 p.m. with opening prayer and pledge of allegiance. Twenty one members were present. Minutes from the September 12, 2023 meeting were approved as read; also approved was the treasurer's report showing a balance of \$1,499.49 in checking and \$2,446.32 in savings for a total of \$3,945.81.

Old Business

<u>West Central Deanery Board Meeting...</u> which we hosted here on September 19th in the Mary Hall entrance area went well with 12 deanery members in attendance gratefully acknowledging our accommodations and hospitality.

<u>Remembrance Mass...</u> Plans are moving along nicely for our November 5th Remembrance Mass. Letters of invitation have gone out to the families of the 8 parishioners who will be remembered. Volunteers are in place to help with the liturgy and the reception which will follow.

<u>October Rosary...</u> Thanks to Lisa Lichte for putting out the sign up sheet; also to those who have lead the rosary prior to our October Sunday Masses. Other are urged to lead (alone or with others) for the remaining Sundays not yet taken.

November 19 Breakfast...Plans were finalized as follows:

<u>Workers List</u>: Pat Salzbrun circulated the list among attendees asking them to make any needed changes. After this, she finalized the list which will be available for pick up, along with raffle tickets, on Sunday, November 5th. List will include a dues reminder.

<u>Food Ordering and Pickup...</u>Motion made and passed that the amount of Pep's Pork ordered by Char be cut back from 170 to 120 lbs. due to a great overage last year. Pick up will be done Saturday morning, November 18th, by Steve and Jolene Brang who will also pick up the Cold Spring Bakery rolls ordered by Vicky Kohorst.

<u>Raffle...</u>Char reported, per bulletin request, donations are coming in and are due by October 28th. Per discussion and motion, quilt from Hildegard Rohe will go on the main raffle; quilt from parish quilters and a Christmas sleigh from Jean Schabel will go on a special Christmas raffle with chances at \$5.00 for each item. There will be a container for the quilt and a separate container for the Christmas sleigh. People contributing to this raffle will decide which item they are purchasing a ticket for (or both items). Besides selling at our breakfast, chances for this special raffle will also be sold Friday evening, November 17th, at the Lux Lions Bingo in Mary Hall (permission from Lions granted post meeting).

<u>Advertising...</u>President Karen reported that our breakfast will be in the November issue of the Central Minnesota Catholic magazine and that both Tri-County News and Cold Spring Record agreed to put in their publications a free announcement. Local parish offices will be sent a notice of our breakfast on October 30th for inclusion in their bulletins.

<u>Eucharistic Revival...</u> Members were shown a short video, "The Veil Removed", depicting prayerfully and powerfully the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Following this, members were given a "Thought Sheet" to take home and ponder privately questions relative to one's response to the Consecration during Mass.

Those present discussed this craft sale and respectfully declined since it would come so soon after our own November 19th Breakfast/Craft Sale event.

<u>Pro Life Notes...</u> Char reported "40 Days for Life" is going well with much positivity both locally and worldwide. She distributed a recent, very well done publication on abortion entitled, "What If?" encouraging members to take it home to read and share with others. She reminded members of Elevate's Evening for Life annual fundraiser event on October 27th, also about the "Save the 12,000" meeting for the St. Cloud area on Monday, October 23rd, 7:00 p.m. at the St. Cloud Library.

<u>Guest Speaker...</u>During the course of the meeting, Linda Allen, Director for the past 8 years of nearby Quiet Oaks Hospice, spoke on "Advanced Care Planning". Her focus was on the importance of having a Health Care Directive, saying "It's the best gift you can give your family should the time come when you cannot speak for yourself", adding she has seen firsthand the turmoil families can have when no such plan is in place. She urged finding the right person to be your spokesperson (does not have to be a family member) making sure they know what you want and that they will carry it out. It's also important to have an alternate should your first choice become unable to do the task. Throughout her talk she referred to items in a Health Care Directive plan which she brought along and sent a copy of this directive home with each member. Following time for questions/answers, she concluded, noting how much Quiet Oaks appreciates the community support shown them and left us with a standing invitation for our group to come to Quiet Oaks sometime for a tour and possibly even hold our meeting there.

RECIPE CORNER

SKILLET CHICKEN WITH APPLES AND ONIONS

4 boneless skinless chicken cutlets (6 oz each) ½ cup all purpose flour, for dredging Kosher salt and pepper, to taste

1 Tbsp, olive oil

2 Tbsp. butter

½ of a sweet onion, thinly sliced

2 medium apples, sliced

2 cloves garlic, pressed or minced

1 Tbsp. minced fresh rosemary

1 cup chicken broth

1/4 - ½ cup heavy whipping cream, at room temperature

2 Tbsp. Dijon mustard

1 tsp. brown sugar (or sub with maple syrup)

- 1. Pat chicken dry and season on all sides with salt and pepper.
- 2. Place the flour in a shallow dish and season with salt and pepper. Dredge each chicken cutlet in the seasoned flour, shaking off any excess flour.
- 3. In a large skillet, heat olive oil over mediumhigh heat. Stir in butter
- 4. When the butter is foamy, add the chicken cutlets to the pan. Cook until chicken is browned on both sides and the meat reaches an internal temperature of 165 degrees, about 3-4 minutes per side. Do not over crowd the pan, so brown the chicken in batches if necessary..
- 5. Remove the chicken to a plate and set aside while you make the sauce.
- 6. Add the sliced onions and apples to the skillet and cook over medium-high heat until the onion is translucent, about 5 minutes. Add the garlic and rosemary, cook, stirring constantly, for 30 seconds.
- 7. Add the chicken broth to the skillet; use a wooden spoon to scrape up any browned bits from the bottom of the pan. Simmer for 3-4 minutes, so that the liquid reduces by about half.
- 8. Reduce heat to low gradually whisk in the cream, Dijon and brown sugar. Start with a bout ¼ cup cream, and then slowly add more, if desired. Cook for a few more minutes to let the sauce thicken (do not boil). Taste and season with salt and pepper.
- 9. Return chicken to the skillet; garnish with additional fresh herbs. Serve immediately.
