#### MAINTENANCE DISCUSSION MEETING Tuesday October 22, 2024

There are plans to restore our church with fresh paint and new flooring, based on the Finance Council's long-range plan. However, there are some additional maintenance or improvement ideas that could be implemented beforehand to help extend the longevity of these projects.

Members of the Finance Council, Parish Trustees, Father Erik, as well as individuals with past experience in decorating or maintaining our church were asked to come together for discussion after Mass on Tuesday, October 22, 2024.

Present for this meeting were Father Erik Lundgren, Ron Albers, Cory Gerads, Todd & Geralyn Hurrle, Kevin Kieke, Kelly Knier, Keith Koltes, Paul Koshiol, Jeanne Lommel, Steve Torborg, and Joe & Kathy Watrin.

The meeting was opened with a prayer led by Father Erik.

#### <u>Agenda:</u>

The agenda of the meeting was reviewed which included reviewing current issues seen within the church building, discussion of the long-range plan budget, and conversations about next steps.

#### Review of pictures:

Attendees reviewed pictures taken from within the church regarding several opportunities for improvement including cracking in the walls, water stains, peeling/chipping paint, and rippling in the carpet.

#### **Discussion:**

There is cracking along the front walls that have been there for many years. The previous time that the church was painted, the cracks came back right away and the thought is that it would likely happen again this time unless major repairs are made. The discussion focused more on ways the cracks could be covered with wood instead of doing major repairs to prevent them before painting. The wall structure is sound and secure but the normal building shifting and settling will continue to incur the cracking. The major repairs discussed would not guarantee the cracking would be prevented, so the possible covering would tend to improve the church appearance long term.

There are water stains in the sanctuary. The belief is that there was some water damage at one point but the roof has been fixed now so stain repellent and paint should cover these spots.

The existing paint is peeling and chipping. At times, it has fallen in the pews from the ceiling. This will be solved when the church is painted. The pews will need to be removed and it would be best to replace flooring at this time. There currently is some rippling in the carpet which could be a tripping hazard.

#### Next Steps:

The St Cloud Diocese has issued a "pause" on major projects for all parishes, so approval would be needed from the Diocese before planning or fundraising could begin for any of this maintenance and painting. If approved, a subcommittee of the Finance Council would be formed to get bids and plan out the work.

To do so, they will check at the rectory for any other historical info there that may be helpful while also gathering and organizing that info to make it more accessible. After completing the form, they will share it with the group via email so all can review and offer any added suggestions before it is sent in.

WELCOMING COMMITTEE...Chairperson, Kathy Watrin, stated our previous welcome packet has been revised (thanks to Karen Des Autels) and will be a great asset in welcoming new members. ## APPLE-CRANBERRY STREUSEL PIE

#### <u>DOUGH</u>

1 1/3 cups all-purpose flour, plus some for dusting 1 tsp. sugar

1/2 tsp kosher salt

1/2 cup cold unsalted butter, cubed

3 to 4 Tbsp. cold whole buttermilk

In the work bowl of a food processor, pulse flour, sugar, and salt. Add cold butter, and pulse until mixture is crumbly. With processor running, gradually add 3 Tbsp. buttermilk until a dough forms; add remaining 1 Tbsp. buttermilk if needed.

Turn out dough onto a lightly floured surface, and shape into a disk. Wrap in plastic wrap, and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes or up to 3 days. Let dough stand at room temperature for 15 minutes before rolling.

#### **FILLING**

4 cups fresh or thawed frozen cranberries
4 cups sliced peeled apples
1 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup granulated sugar
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup cornstarch
2 tsp. ground ginger
<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup old-fashioned oats
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup all-purpose flour, plus more for dusting
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup firmly packed light brown sugar
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup unsalted butter, melted
Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

1. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough to 1/8 inch thickness. Transfer to a 10 inch pie plate pressing into bottom and up sides. Fold edges under, and crimp as desired.

2. In a large saucepan, stir together cranberries, apples, granulated sugar, cornstarch and ginger. Cook over medium heat stirring frequently, until thickened and bubbly. Spoon into prepared crust.

3. In a small bowl, stir together oats, flour, brown sugar, and melted butter. Sprinkle onto fruit mixture.

4. Bake until crust is golden brown and filling is bubbly, 45 to 50 minut4es. Let cool on a wire rack for at least 1 hour before serving.

### SPICED PUMPKIN BREAD

2 ½ cups all-purpose flour
1 Tbsp. plus 2 tsp. Pumpkin pie spice
2 tsp. baking powder
2 tsp. kosher salt
½ tsp. ground black pepper
1 (15 oz) can pumpkin

(15 oz) can pumpkin
 cup granulated sugar
 2/3 cup oil, plus more for scoring
 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
 large eggs, room temperature
 tsp. vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Spray an 8  $\frac{1}{2}$  x 4  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch loaf pan with baking spray with flour. Line pan with parchment paper, letting excess extend over all sides of pan.

In a large bowl, whisk together flour, pie spice, baking powder, salt and pepper.

In a medium bowl, whisk together pumpkin, granulated sugar, oil, brown sugar, eggs, and vanilla until smooth. Fold pumpkin mixture into flour mixture until smooth. Spread batter into prepared pan. Firmly tap on a kitchen towel-lined counter to settle batter. Using a offset spatula dipped in oil, score a line down center of batter, leaving about a 1 inch border on short sides of pan.

Bake until wooden pick inserted in center comes out with a few moist crumbs, 1½ hours to 1 hour and 40 minutes. Let cool in pan for 10 minutes. Using excess parchment as handles, remove from pan, and let cool completely on a wire rack. Store in an airtight container for up to 3 days.

## MINUTES FROM ST ANNE'S CHRISTIAN WOMEN'S MEETING - 11/12/2024

St. Anne's Christian Women met Tuesday, November 12, 2024 in Mary Hall beginning with fellowship and refreshments at 6:30 p.m. followed by President Karen DesAutels calling the business meeting to order at 6:45 p.m. with opening prayer and pledge of allegiance. Twenty-one members were present.

Minutes from the October 8, 2024 meeting were read, motion to approve was made, motion seconded and passed; also read was the Treasurer's report showing a balance of \$ 3,544.29 in savings and \$757.23 in checking for a total of \$4,301.52. A motion was made to approve the Treasurer's report, motion was seconded and passed.

#### OLD BUSINESS

#### Remembrance Mass - November 3, 2024

Karen reported 70 people attended the reception. Nine tables were filled with family and friends of the deceased parishioners being remembered. Donuts, coffee and juice were provided, along with the addition of sweet breads provided by our members. The donuts were provided by a new vendor, Casey's of St. Augusta. Casey's did an amazing job and the 7 dozen donuts were less expensive than the previous vendor. The total spent by Christian Women for this wonderful celebration of former parishioners equaled \$123.46.

#### November Breakfast – November 24, 2024

Worker's list/Raffle ticket envelopes were in back of church this last weekend for pickup. The basket of those remaining was passed around for those in attendance to look through for neighbors/friends that could be hand delivered to save money on postage. It was noted and acknowledged that some members are no longer able/wanting to be on worker's list due to health or moving. # Our Catholic Liturgical Year



**Advent** - four weeks of preparation b the celebration of Jesus' birth

*Christmas*- recalling the Nativity of Jesus Christ and his manifestation to the peoples of the world

*Lent* - a six-week period of penance before Easter

## Sacred Paschal Tríduum- the

holiest "Three Days" of the Church's year, where the Christian people recall the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus

**Easter** - 50 days of joyful celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead and His sending forth of the Holy Spirit

Ordínary Tíme- divided into two sections (one span of 4-8 weeks after Christmas Time and another lasting about six months after Easter Time), wherein the faithful consider the fullness of Jesus' teachings and works among his people The mystery of Christ, unfolded through the cycle of the year, calls us to live his mystery in our own lives. This call is best illustrated in the lives of Mary and the saints, celebrated by the Church throughout the year. There is no tension between the mystery of Christ and the celebration of the saints, but rather a marvelous harmony.

The Blessed Virgin Mary is joined by an inseparable bond to the saving work of her Son, and the feasts of all the Saints proclaim the wonderful works of Christ in his servants and offer the faithful fitting examples for their imitation.
