

### **BLESSING OF HOLY OILS**

Bishop Neary will bless the holy oils during a Mass at St. Mary's Cathedral on April 10th for use in parishes during the year. These three oils are contained in the ambry located near the baptismal font at St. Wendelin.

**OIL OF THE SICK** is used in the sacrament of the sick to "bring the strengthening and healing power of Christ".

**OIL OF CATECHUMENS** is used at Baptism to remove original sin and for the anointed one to become a member of the church.

**SACRED (HOLY) CHRISM** is used to anoint Confirmation candidates, also to anoint the hands of a priest and the head of a bishop at their ordination. This oil is used in the dedication ceremony of a new church. The bishop anoints the altar and also the walls in 12 to 14 places.

### **STRAWBERRY-LEMON TIRAMISU**

2 lbs. fresh strawberries, hulled and quartered

1 1/4 cups granulated sugar, divided

4 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice, divided

1/4 tsp. kosher salt

½ cup water

1 (8 oz) package cream cheese, softened

3/4 cup confectioners' sugar

2 1/4 cups cold heavy whipping cream

2 tsp. vanilla extract

1 (7 oz) package crisp ladyfingers

Sliced strawberries, for topping

Garnish: fresh mint

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

In a 13 x 9 glass baking dish, stir together quartered strawberries, ¼ cup sugar, 2 Tbsp. lemon juice, and salt until well combined.

Bake until berries are very soft and fragrant and have released ample juices, about 30 minutes, stirring every 10 minutes. Immediately strain strawberries through mesh sieve over heatproof bowl, reserving juice and berries separately.

Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup water, remaining 1 cup sugar, and remaining 2 Tbsp. lemon juice to berry juice, and whisk until sugar dissolves.

In a bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a whisk attachment, beat cream cheese and confectioners' sugar at medium speed until combined; scrape sides of bowl. With mixer on medium low speed add cold cream in a slow, steady stream; scrape sides of bowl. Beat at medium-high speed until stiff peaks form, 2 to 3 minutes. Beat in vanilla.

Spread a thin layer of cream cheese in bottom of an 8 inch square baking dish.

Dip about half of ladyfingers into juice mixture, tightly arranging in a single layer in pan, cutting to fit if necessary. Spoon more juice mixture onto ladyfingers as needed to soak any dry spots. Top with half of the roasted strawberries. Spread a thick layer of cream cheese mixture unto ladyfingers in pan. Repeat procedure with remaining ladyfingers, remaining juice mixture, remaining roasted strawberries, and remaining cream cheese mixture. Cover and refrigerate for 6 hours or overnight. Serve chilled. Top with sliced strawberries. Garnish with mint, if desired.

### **DIVINE MERCY**

Have you ever had a song verse run thru your mind, repeating itself time and time again?

Most of us have, myself included. The song I was hearing over and over recently is one that has become popular of late in our liturgies, "Go Make a Difference". Indeed, don't we all want to make a difference? That said, our Parish Liturgy Committee is attempting to do just that by promoting the



Divine Mercy feast and devotion. Hence, this article which hopefully will deepen your understanding while encouraging you to make Divine Mercy practice a part of your daily walk with the Lord.

First off, the feast of Divine Mercy is relatively new, coming up on its silver jubilee in just a few weeks. Yes, come April 30<sup>th</sup> ,2025, it will be 25 years since Pope John Paul II (now St. John Paul) in Rome, before a crowd of some 200,000 people, canonized to sainthood, his fellow Pole, and humble nun, Sr. Marina Faustina Kowalska. After this momentous event, he is said to have remarked, "This is the happiest day of my life." Then just 5 days later on May 5<sup>th</sup>, (another silver jubilee) he proclaimed that going forward, each year the Sunday after Easter would be Divine Mercy Sunday, which this year will be April 27<sup>th</sup>.

The feast is based on diary revelations about divine mercy received in the 1930's by Sr. Faustina, during which, at different times, Jesus requested that a feast of Divine Mercy

be established. Also approved by the Pope was the Divine Mercy image which depicts Jesus with His right hand raised in blessing with red and white rays coming from His heart signifying the blood and water which He shed for our salvation. At the bottom are the words, "Jesus, I Trust in You", the very heart of the Divine Mercy message. You're likely well aware that this image is prominently displayed in our church towards the front on the St. Joseph side just behind the piano. There is also a smaller image just to the right as you come into church on the table by the holy water font, with small Divine Mercy holy cards available for the taking.

Other practices associated with Divine Mercy include the chaplet prayer which is said on rosary beads, the Novena which begins each Good Friday and the daily 3:00 pm Hour of Mercy or "Hour of Power" as dubbed by Drew Mariani , author and Relevant radio personality, in his book "Divine Mercy". Mariani reminds us to "**Pray Big**" citing numerous examples of appeals to Divine Mercy powerfully answered going so far as to say the 2009 Miracle on the Hudson (the plane that crash landed in the Hudson River with all passengers and crew surviving) led to another miracle, a Miracle of Divine Mercy!!! Yes, Mariani states, that although exceptional pilot skill surely played a part in the happy ending to this very risky crash landing, yet another little known but even more important factor came into play. He indicates the safe landing could well be attributed to the fact

that a passenger had prayed the Divine Mercy chaplet the previous day during the Hour of Mercy and at the time of the crash landing (3:30 pm ...midway thru the Hour of Mercy), that same passenger was reading Sister's "Diary". Speculation? Definitely! Only God knows for sure! But Mariani leaves little doubt that **great favors can be obtained via appealing to Divine Mercy especially during the 3:00 to 4:00 pm hour** and that he believes Divine Mercy played a key role in this happy ending!!!

So how are we to respond to this feast? As Fr. Joseph, MIC said in an article in the Spring 2025 issue of *Marian Helper*, "We are meant to be the living Images of Divine Mercy, shining rays from our hearts just as Jesus does!" In other words, always reach out to others with the same love and mercy that Jesus so readily shows us!

Hopefully the above has given you some of the basics about Divine Mercy and perhaps even whet your appetite to learn more. If that's the case, please know there's a wealth of information out there, whether it be pamphlets, videos, many books including Faustina's "Diary, also the above mentioned "Divine Mercy" by Drew Mariani and finally the "By His Mercy" books (series of 4 first printed in 2018) by local author, Tricia Walz. Walz's series highlights how ordinary Catholics (including some you might well know) have seen God's mercy in their lives. Check with your favorite book store or go on line to learn firsthand how to get these and other materials that are abundantly available.

As we come closer to the actual April 27<sup>th</sup> feast day, please watch upcoming bulletins for more information on Divine Mercy facets. On the feast day, various parishes throughout the diocese (including nearby St. Mary's Cathedral in St. Cloud) will mark the day with special services that may include Adoration, speakers, opportunity for Confession, private prayer along with the availability of a plenary indulgence. Details will be shared as they become available.

In the meantime, as followers of Jesus, no matter what we encounter in our daily faith walk,

may our wholehearted trust in Jesus, enable us to live out the Divine Mercy message by emphatically saying time and again
