FINANCE COUNCIL MINUTES

Thursday, March 20, 2025

Unapproved Minutes

St. Wendelin's Finance Council held its meeting on Thursday, March 20, 2025, at 7:00 p.m. in the St. Wendelin's library.

Opened with a prayer led by Kelly Knier.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Jeanne Lommel, Todd Hurtle, Lisa Lichte, Kelly Knier, new member, Lisa Gerken, and Trustee Joe Watrin.
Absent (Excused): Trustee Erin Lommel.
Guest: Kathy Watrin.

REVIEW OF AGENDA:

The meeting agenda was reviewed. A motion to approve the agenda as written was made by Todd, seconded by Lisa L, and carried unanimously.

REVIEW OF PREVIOUS MINUTES:

A motion to approve the minutes from the January 16, 2025, meeting was made by Todd, seconded by Joe, and carried unanimously.

FINANCIAL REPORTS:

The council briefly reviewed the financial reports. Weekly collections are under budget this fiscal year; however, this is offset by the festival exceeding budget expectations. Expenses are over budget due to several factors, including the replacement of the dual-unit furnace system in the church in January. Despite this, the checking account maintains a healthy balance, and two short-term CDs were purchased in February. A motion to approve the financial reports was made by Kelly, seconded by Todd, and carried unanimously.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

The Long-range plan was reviewed. No major expenses are expected in the near future. However, painting and new flooring projects are planned once the diocese lifts its current pause.

The Rec Club will make a donation to the Endowment Fund for part of the cost of the driveway sealing.

The endowments performed well in 2024. A motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Todd, to distribute \$300 each to the two students and one adult chaperone parishioners attending the

Steubenville conference this summer. At the May meeting, the council will review and vote on the distribution for students from St. Wendelin's families enrolled in the school.

Action Item: Kelly will complete and submit the form for the Steubenville donation.

Action Item: Jeanne will contact Bonnie to estimate the number of students from registered St. Wendelin's families expected to enroll next year.

OLD BUSINESS:

The council decided to pause on an additional donation to the Faith Formation program this late in the season. St. Mary's Help of Christians has informed the other parishes that beginning next year, they will charge \$200 per parish per month during the school year for renting the school space for Faith Formation.

NEW BUSINESS:

Expenses for parish breakfasts have increased over the years, while ticket prices have remained stable. Other local churches have increased their adult ticket prices to \$12. For consistency, the council recommends setting the price for all St. Wendelin's group breakfast ticket prices at \$12 for adults while keeping children's tickets at \$5.

Action Item: Jeanne will contact group leaders to inform them of the recommended pricing.

The council reviewed the preliminary budget in depth. The budget is balanced, though minor adjustments were suggested to individual line items for accuracy. The final budget will be voted on at the May meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 8:52 p.m. with a closing prayer lead by Todd.

STRAWBERRY RHUBARB SLUMP

1 pint strawberries, green tops removed, cut into large pieces
2 cups cut-up rhubarb
½ cup sugar
½ cup water
1 cup all purpose flour, sifted
2 tsp. baking powder
¼ tsp. salt
½ cup milk
Lightly sweetened whipped cream

In a saucepan with a tight-fitting lid, combine the strawberries, rhubarb, sugar and 1/2 cup water. Cook over medium heat at a simmer for about 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, in a bowl, stir together the flour, baking powder and salt. Add the milk and quickly combine. Drop the batter by spoonfuls onto the surface of the slightly simmering fruit. Cook for 10 minutes uncovered, then place a lid on and cook another 10 minutes.

Serve in shallow bowls, topped with whipped cream.

A slump is in the family of cooked or stewed fruit with raised dough on top. Some are golden brown baked pastry over seasonal fruits like cobblers and some are simmered on the stove like a slump. So this is more like a big boiled dumpling over cooked fruit, which slumps when you put it on the plate.

Beginning today, treat everyone you meet as if they were going to be dead by midnight. Extend to them all the care, kindness and understanding you can muster, and do it with no thought of any reward. Your life will never be the same again.

HOW TO USE BLESSED SALT AT HOME

For many generations, blessed salt served several purposes. You can use blessed salt in the following ways:

1. **Create a spiritual barrier of protection in your homes to ward off evil spirits**

You can use Blessed Salt to consecrate the living space your children are raised in unto God. Just as the Passover lamb was not magic blood, so should Blessed Salt not be diminished as magic salt. Rather, it shows outward expression of one's faith and a way to invoke God's grace.

You can sprinkle Blessed Salt in doorways, entrances, under the bed, cabinets, mirrors, window sills and corners of the room.

You can also place it in a small container and then put in your bag or pockets.

2. **Bless those under your charge**

The father is the head of the family. In the Catholic Church's teaching, he is also the domestic priest. What does this mean? It means he has the power to bless and curse the people under his household.

To exercise spiritual authority over his family, home and properties, he can say the following prayers:

Prayer for Blessing a House with Salt

The Archdiocese of Manila Office of Exorcism shared a simple prayer to say when using Blessed Salt to bless a home. The head of the family will exercise spiritual authority over the property in using Blessed Salt with this prayer:

"I seal this (room or home) in the Precious Blood of Jesus Christ our Savior, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

3. **When building a new home, sprinkle on the foundations of the house.**

You can sprinkle a generous amount of blessed salt on the slab of your homes before construction commences.

What a creative way to create a spiritual barrier that can never be carried off by winds or foot traffic!

4. **As food seasoning, blessed salt can be used in cooking or baking**

Instead of an ordinary salt, use a blessed salt when cooking or baking.

Even if not used with food, you can consume blessed salt before you go outside your homes to ask for protection and blessings.

5. **Use it as spiritual protection while traveling.**

Blessed Salt may also be used in cars and hotels where you and your family may be staying.
