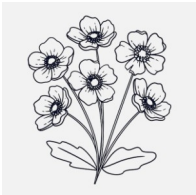

FINANCE COUNCIL MINUTES

Thursday, February 19, 2026

Unapproved Minutes

St. Wendelin's Finance Council met on Thursday, February 19, 2026, at 6:00 p.m. in the St. Wendelin's library. This meeting was rescheduled from January 29.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Father Erik Lundgren, Jeanne Lommel, Todd Hurre, Lisa Lichte, Mike Ritzer, Kelly Knier; and Trustees Erin Lommel and Joe Watrin.

Absent (Excused): Lisa Gertken

Guest: Tracy Dombrowski

The meeting was opened with a prayer led by Father Erik.

REVIEW OF AGENDA:

The agenda was reviewed. A motion to approve the agenda was made by Kelly, seconded by Lisa, and carried unanimously.

REVIEW OF PREVIOUS MINUTES:

The minutes from November 20, 2025, meeting were reviewed. A motion to approve the minutes was made by Erin, seconded by Todd, and carried unanimously.

FINANCIAL REPORTS:

The council reviewed the financial reports. Income is slightly over budget, and expenses are slightly below budget. A motion to approve the financial reports was made by Kelly, seconded by Lisa, and carried unanimously.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Endowments:

The endowment funds are performing well. The council expressed its desire to continue using available funds for the purposes for which they were established.

Action Item: Todd will review the reports to calculate the amount available for disbursement in each of the three funds before the next meeting.

Action Item: Jeanne will review the GL entries for the Education Endowment funds to confirm consistency across reports.

Action Item: Kelly will submit a bulletin announcement regarding parish support for attendees of the Steubenville Conference and Extreme Faith Camp and will confirm whether any parishioners attended the SEEK Conference in January.

School:

The school is doing well and considering hiring another teacher for next year. For the upcoming fiscal year, a portion of the money received from the Parish Festival will go straight to the school, and the monthly parish subsidy will be reduced in a like amount.

All Things New:

The CAP has voted to affirm the merger of the five parishes in the Holy Saints ACC into one parish and corporation, pending Bishop Neary's final decision. Letters have been sent to parishioners regarding this update. Additional planning and organization will be required to implement the changes once a final decision is made.

OLD BUSINESS:

Mike was welcomed as the newest member of the Finance Council. There are still openings available for others willing to serve.

NEW BUSINESS:

The first draft of the 2026–2027 budget was reviewed. Suggestions were discussed, and a revised draft will be reviewed at the March meeting. The final budget will be voted on in May.

MISCELLANEOUS: Ash Wednesday Mass attendance was very strong at both SMHOC and St. Wendelin's. It was noted that there is currently no Ash Wednesday envelope included in the collection envelopes.

Action item: Todd will look into adding an Ash Wednesday envelope to the collection packet.

It was noted that the responsibility for mail collection will need to be reassigned.

Action item: Father will discuss mail distribution with parish and school staff. He will coordinate with Todd to work through Mail distribution changes.

A special joint meeting with the other finance councils in the ACC will be held on March 19 at SMHOC. Finance Council members are encouraged to attend.

The meeting adjourned at 7:55 p.m. with a closing prayer led by Father Erik.

RECIPE CORNER

**MAPLE-GLAZED SWEET POTATO
WITH TANGY RICOTTA AND
CRANBERRY DRIZZLE**

2 large sweet potatoes, sliced into 1/2-inch rounds

2 Tbsp olive oil

2 Tbsp pure maple syrup

Salt & pepper, to taste

1/2 cup ricotta cheese

1/4 cup cranberry sauce or cranberry compote

1 Tbsp balsamic glaze

2 Tbsp chopped toasted pecans or walnuts

Fresh thyme leaves, for garnish

1. Preheat your oven to 400°F and line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

2. In a bowl, toss the sweet potato rounds with olive oil, maple syrup, salt, and pepper until they are evenly coated.

3. Arrange the sweet potatoes in a single layer on the prepared baking sheet. Roast them for 25-30 minutes, flipping halfway through, until they turn golden and caramelized around the edges.

4. Once they're done roasting, let them cool slightly.

5. Spread a spoonful of ricotta over each sweet potato round, then drizzle with cranberry sauce and a touch of balsamic glaze.

6. Finish with a sprinkle of chopped nuts and garnish with fresh thyme. Serve warm and enjoy this sweet, tangy, and creamy delight!

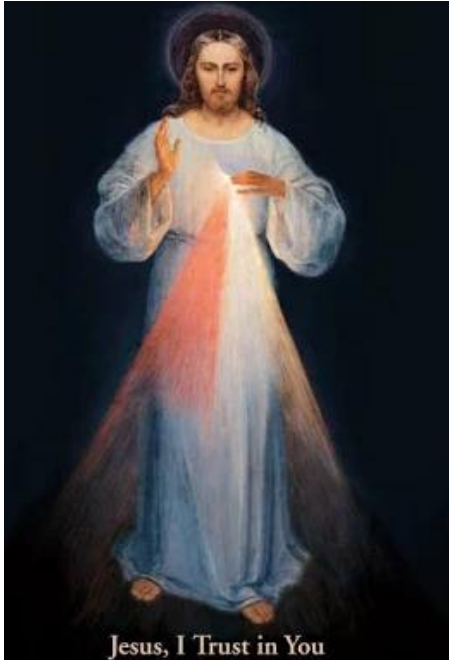

CELEBRATION OF DIVINE MERCY—JESUS I TRUST IN YOU!

Back in 2000, Pope John Paul II, proclaimed the Feast of Divine Mercy is to be celebrated each year on the Sunday after Easter. This year that will be April 12th. The feast is based on diary revelations received in the 1930's by Sister Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun, whom Pope John had canonized a saint, just 5 days prior to his proclamation about the annual feast day.



A common devotion associated with this feast is the **Novena** **which begins on Good Friday, April 3** and ends on Saturday, April 11, the day before the feast day. Pamphlets on how to pray the Novena are available from the back of church.

On the April 12th feast day, during our 10:00 am Mass, the large framed picture from the front sidewall, will be prominently displayed. Also immediately following Mass, Father Erik will lead us in praying the chaplet. In the afternoon, St. Mary's Cathedral in St. Cloud, will have a special **Divine Mercy program from 1:00 until 3:00 pm** including Adoration and private prayer, speakers, praise/ singing as well as the opportunity for Confession. The Paschal Triduum: Meaning, History, and Sacred Liturgies

The **Paschal Triduum** is the most solemn and profound period in the Church's liturgical year. Spanning three days—Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday—it commemorates the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Rather than separate celebrations, these days form one continuous liturgy that invites believers into the heart of the Christian mystery: redemption through sacrifice and the promise of new life.

1. Holy Thursday (Mass of the Lord's Supper)

Meaning

Holy Thursday marks the beginning of the Triduum. It commemorates the Last Supper of Jesus with His disciples, where He instituted the Eucharist and the priesthood. It is a day centered on love, service, and the gift of Christ's presence.

Symbols

- **Bread and Wine** – Represent the Body and Blood of Christ, recalling the institution of the Eucharist.
- **Washing of Feet** – Symbolizes humility and service, reflecting Jesus washing the disciples' feet.
- **Altar of Repose** – A place where the consecrated Eucharist is kept for adoration after Mass, recalling Jesus' prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Liturgy

The evening Mass of the Lord's Supper is rich in symbolism. It includes the Gloria (which will not be sung again until the Easter Vigil), the washing of feet, and a solemn procession transferring the Eucharist to the altar of repose. The liturgy ends in silence, with the altar stripped bare, signaling the transition into Christ's passion.

2. Good Friday (Celebration of the Passion of the Lord)

Meaning

Good Friday is a day of sorrow and reflection, commemorating the suffering and crucifixion of Jesus. Despite its somber tone, it is called "good" because it reveals the depth of God's love and the salvation won through Christ's sacrifice.

Symbols

- **The Cross** – The central symbol of the day, representing both suffering and victory.
- **Red Vestments** – Signify the blood of Christ and martyrdom.
- **Silence and Darkness** – Reflect mourning and the gravity of the event.

Liturgy

There is no Mass celebrated on Good Friday. Instead, the liturgy consists of three parts:

1. **Liturgy of the Word** – Includes the reading of the Passion narrative.
2. **Veneration of the Cross** – The faithful reverence the cross, often by kissing or touching it.
3. **Holy Communion** – Distributed using hosts consecrated on Holy Thursday.

The service is solemn, simple, and deeply moving, emphasizing contemplation of Christ's sacrifice.

THE PASCHAL TRIDUUM CONTINUED

3. Holy Saturday (The Easter Vigil)

Meaning

Holy Saturday is a day of waiting and quiet hope. It commemorates the time Jesus lay in the tomb and anticipates His resurrection. The highlight of this day is the Easter Vigil, the most important liturgy of the entire year.

Symbols

- **Fire and the Paschal Candle** – Represent Christ as the Light of the World, overcoming darkness.
- **Water** – Used in baptisms and renewal of baptismal promises, symbolizing new life.
- **White Vestments** – Signify joy, purity, and resurrection.

Liturgy

The Easter Vigil takes place after nightfall and includes four main parts:

1. **Service of Light** – The new fire is blessed, and the Paschal Candle is lit.
2. **Liturgy of the Word** – A series of readings recount salvation history.
3. **Liturgy of Baptism** – New members are baptized and welcomed into the Church.
4. **Liturgy of the Eucharist** – The first Mass of Easter, celebrating the resurrection.

This liturgy marks the dramatic transition from darkness to light, from death to life.

The Liturgies of the Triduum as One Celebration

Though spread over three days, the Triduum is understood as a single, unified liturgy. It begins with the evening Mass on Holy Thursday and concludes with the Easter Vigil. There is no formal dismissal at the end of Holy Thursday or Good Friday services, emphasizing continuity. The faithful journey spiritually with Christ—from the table of the Last Supper, through the suffering of the cross, to the triumph of the resurrection.

Historical Development of the Paschal Triduum

The origins of the Paschal Triduum date back to the early centuries of Christianity. By the 4th century, Christians in Jerusalem were already observing detailed commemorations of Christ's passion and resurrection, as recorded in the writings of the pilgrim Egeria.

Over time, these observances spread throughout the Christian world and developed into the structured liturgies seen today. In the Middle Ages, some elements became more elaborate, though at times less accessible to the faithful. Significant reforms came in the 20th century, particularly under Pope Pius XII, who restored the Easter Vigil to its proper place at night and emphasized active participation.

Following the Second Vatican Council (1962–1965), further reforms clarified the unity of the Triduum and encouraged deeper engagement with Scripture, symbolism, and communal worship.

Conclusion

The Paschal Triduum stands at the center of Christian faith and worship. Through its rich symbols, solemn liturgies, and deep historical roots, it invites believers into a transformative encounter with the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection. From the humility of service on Holy Thursday to the sorrow of Good Friday and the radiant hope of Holy Saturday, the Triduum reveals a journey from darkness into eternal light.

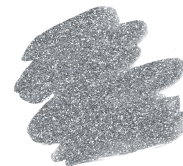

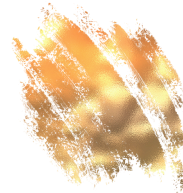
